# Award for Distinguished Service to Development Sociology

**Samuel Cohn** has received the Award for Distinguished Service to Development Sociology from the American Sociological Association Section on Development Sociology. This is the first time that this award has ever been given.

The award was actually NAMED the Samuel Cohn Award for Distinguished Service to Development Sociology. It is extremely unusual for an ASA award to be named after a living sociologist—let alone to be named after a recipient.

"The Sam Cohn Distinguished Service Award" is a new section award that will be given occasionally (at the discretion of the Council) to recognize extraordinary contributions to service by scholars and practitioners who work in the field of development.

"I know that I speak on behalf of the whole Council in saying that your contributions to service in the field of development have been beyond extraordinary. You are a model for all of us, and all future recipients of this award will build on the work and example that you have set."

Dr. Plankey-Videla's book was the subject of an "Author Meets Critic" session for her award-winning book We Are in This Dance Together: Gender, Power, and Globalization at a Mexican Garment Firm at the Southwestern Sociological Association Meetings, April 19, 2014. The session was organized by Dr. Carol Walther, with Dr. Mary Romero (Arizona State University), Dr. Maria Cristina Morales (University of Texas, El Paso), Dr. Lorena Murga (University of Texas, El Paso), and Dr. Jennifer Bair (University of Colorado at Boulder) as discussants.



Dr. John Eason was an invited speaker on the Crime, Law, and Deviance Invited Session: Race, Criminal Justice and Inequality. The section explored the myriad ways that race shapes criminal justice in the United States. #### KLAMS WORKSHOP

On May 19-20 the Howard B. Kaplan Laboratory for Social Science Research and the Department of Sociology at Texas A&M University hosted a workshop introducing the Kaplan Longitudinal and Multigenerational Study (KLAMS) to researchers. The workshop was led by Dr. Jane Sell, Dr. Heili Pals, and Dr. Tony Love. Graduate students Xavier Serna, Calixto Melero, and Huong Lê helped with the organization.

Thirty scholars from around the country, including researchers from the University of Kentucky, Miami University, Kent State University, University of Oklahoma, Rice University, University of California Merced, Bowling Green State University, the University of New learn about and discuss: Orleans, and Texas A&M University attended the workshop. The researchers represented various fields, including

education, deviance, criminology, race research, and stratification.

Among invited guests was Dr. Diane Kaplan, late Dr. Howard Kaplan's wife • who has been involved in this project from the very beginning onwards. Also, Dr. Robert Johnson and Dr. Mitchell Beck who worked as a post doc with Dr. Kaplan during early waves of the data collection attended. Dr. Johnson is the current chair of the Department of Sociology, University of Miami. Dr. Mitchell Beck is an Associate Professor at the Department of Sociology, University of Oklahoma.

- Appropriate longitudinal methods by Dr. Chuck Huber (an invited expert from STATA Corp)
- In-depth discussions on streamlining the administration of KLAMS data and making the data accessible to scholars and researchers

The mini-conference ended with several enthusiastic mini-presentations on proposed future projects in various areas of research. Several proposals have already been submitted over the summer and are in the approval process. All attendees of this first miniconference were excited about the number and quality of research possibilities available through Dr. Kaplan's unique scholarly legacy.

### **GRANT**

Nancy Plankey-Videla and Zulema Valdez (University of California-Merced) received a NSF-ASA Fund for the Advancement of the Discipline grant for the study "The Effects of Legal Status on the Social and Economic Incorporation of Mexican-Origin Mixed Status Families in the Southwest." The project compares the effect of deportation regimes in California and Texas on mixed-status families, that is, families that are composed documented and undocumented members.

Based in part on data collected as part of the 2012 and 2013 Mobile Consular Survey by Nancy Plankey-Videla, Zulema Valdez (University of California, Merced), and Nadia Flores (Texas Tech) on the Mexican community in Bryan/College Station and the 2010 Day Labor Survey by Nancy Plankey-Videla and Yan Hong (School of Public Health), the Brazos Interfaith Immigration Network (BIIN) received funding from Catholic Charities of Central Texas to hire the Equal Justice Center labor lawyers to represent immigrant workers in the Brazos Valley. Sociology graduate students Beatriz Aldana, Michel In-

fante, Edmundo Garcia, Jenn Guillen, Arlett Lomeli, Guadalupe Marquez Velarde, Angelica Menchaca, Oscar Morales, Melissa Ochoa, David Orta, Juan Salinas, and Alma Treviño, all assisted in the research. On August 19, 2014 the Austin -based Equal Justice Center filed a federal suit against a local janitorial company for wage theft due to misclassification of immigrant workers as independent contractors. 

Charity Clay starts her tenure track job at Merritt College in Oakland.




**Layton Field** is now faculty at Mount St. Mary's College
